



A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR TIM

"A Time of Endings and New Beginnings"



Sunday, October 30th of this year is Reformation Sunday, when we celebrate the new beginning that we have to proclaim the hope of love of God through the gospel of Christ Jesus. And then the following Sunday, November 6th, is All Saints Sunday, when we remember those in faith who have died in Christ's loving arms. We go immediately from new beginnings to the hope when mortal life ends.

The National Day of Thanks-giving (Thanksgiving Day) is on Thursday, November 24th and this marks the beginning of the holiday season that we have at the end of the year. And the Sunday of Thanksgiving Day weekend, November 27th, marks the beginning of a new church year

with the season of Advent, when we look forward in hope to the new ways that Christ is coming into our lives and into the world for its salvation.

This is also a time that is filled with mixed emotions by many people. It is a busy time of year in workplaces and at home and this fills us with frustration and anxiety. Signs of winter are in the air that fills us with gloom (even if the signs of winter in this place are simply strong winds that chill us). The Christmas shopping season is in full swing and this often is difficult for low-income families and the unemployed and homeless.

People are excited about the holidays. But those without families or grieving the loss of loved ones often feel very alone at this time of year. Family gatherings can bring love and joy or they may bring more abuse for people. And the end of the year is when the rates of depression,

anxiety, and suicides increase.

Many people just don't know what to do with these mixed emotions. But still we have the gospel message that there is always hope for a new life in Christ Jesus no matter what happens. And that's why we celebrate in the midst of the darkness.

So trust that God's love is with you and share the hope that we have in Christ so we can praise God all the more at the end of the year.

What is LSM? Lutheran Summer Music (LSM) is where music, community, and faith intersect and create a life-changing experience for young musicians. As the nation's premier faith-based music academy this four-week, immersive residential performance and training program is for students, grades 8–12.

What's LSM like? Students participate in large ensembles (band, choir, orchestra) and chamber music; receive lessons on primary and secondary instruments; and enroll in electives such as chapel choir, church music, handbells, composition, jazz band, conducting, musical theatre, and more. The daily schedule includes morning and evening prayer, classes, recreation activities, and concerts by faculty and guest artists.

Why LSM? Generations of alumni discovered their vocations by attending LSM and now serve as pastors, musicians, composers, teachers, and more—connecting the communities they serve through faith and music. Our vision is to see churches and communities renewed through music for the sake of the world.

Do students receive scholarships? Yes! LSM offers a robust matching fund program which allows many students and families to reduce out-of-pocket costs. Donations from church and community organizations are eligible to be matched by LSM at 50% for the full fourweek session.





Diakonia helps equip God's people for service in the congregation and the neighborhood.

Are you wondering:

- •What is next?
- •What leads to freedom?
- •Where can I receive a foundation for my faith?

The Diakonia program provides a system of study to help answer those questions.

Students learn from ordained pastors in a cohort setting. They study traditional seminary disciplines, identify their particular gifts, and are encouraged to grow spiritually.

Diakonia is a two-year program that includes courses on theology, worship, Bible, church history, and practical ministry.

Each class is five weeks in length, three hours one day a week. Students should plan for 4-6 hours per week of work outside of class time.






