A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR TIM

"The Gift of the ELCA"

On June 9th &10th, I am attending the Grand Canyon Synod Assembly at Resurrection Lutheran Church in Oro Valley in the Tucson area. This reminds me that something that I probably don't talk about enough as a pastor is about how much of a gift the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (the ELCA) truly is for me.

In 1987, three Lutheran church bodies merged together: the Lutheran Church in America (the LCA), the American Lutheran Church (the ALC), and the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Congregations (the AELC). When the process of merging was taking place, I was active in a Lutheran Campus Ministry at my university that was run jointly by those three church bodies. And my home congregation in Bruce, South Dakota voted to not go into this new ELCA.

My home congregation feared that this new church would be too authoritarian (giving too much power to bishops and church hierarchy), too liberal on social issues (eventually endorsing homosexuals as pastors), and not literal enough in its understanding of the Bible. At my campus ministry, I had friends who came from churches that were more traditional in their practices than my church was. and friends who were more liberal than I was about social issues. and friends who were more conservative than I was on biblical issues. I found the variety of differing of opinions exciting and helpful in my growth in faith.

So I joined the ELCA in order to be a part of this new church.



The ELCA has a more unique mission than any other Lutheran churches in the U.S.: it insists on having more dialogue and outreach to other churches that were not Lutheran, it insists on giving a voice to both liberal and conservative members of the church so we can discern together how to respond to social issues as a church, it insists on having more inclusivity in our clergy by having women and people of color serving as ordained pastors, and it insists on having more professional lav leadership in the church by people who are not ordained pastors. Not only that but the ELCA has a unique structure that no other Lutheran church body has in our country in which the ELCA's churchwide structure, the local synods, and the local congregations all have autonomy as their own churches, but work together

nevertheless. When I first learned what this structure was in 1987. I was convinced that it would never work. And now 36 years later, it is still working.

And the ELCA has some of the most effective social and outreach organizations that there is; including Lutheran Social Services, Lutheran Family Services, ELCA Disaster Relief, Lutheran Immigration Service, Lutheran Refugee Service, ELCA World Hunger Appeal, Lutheran World Relief, ELCA Outdoor Ministries, ELCA Campus Ministries, ELCA Global Mission, the Women of the ELCA, and the Lutheran Men in Mission. All of these organizations are very effective in reaching out to members. And the ELCA is living people in varying situations. And every month a percentage of our

offerings go to help these organiza- And personally, I find this to be tions through our local synod (the Grand Canyon Synod).

During the last 36 years, the ELCA has had its share of controversies and scandals. But having grown up in a large family, I have come to expect this in groups where diverse people are coming together and trying to share Christ's love in different ways together. These scandals and controversies are just growing pains.

In 1 Corinthians, the apostle Paul insisted that the church can have diverse views among its membership and still serve the one Christ as one body with many diverse the apostle Paul's vision of what being a church is.

exciting. The Church is definitely growing spiritually if not in numbers. And with growth comes change that is often frustrating and scary and filled with remarkable gifts.

That's how the Holy Spirit works among us.

So I encourage you not to be so negative in your attitudes toward the church. There are a lot of good things happening, and we are a part of it. Give thanks to God for this precious gift and our calling to be a part of it.

Stewardship of our bodily health

Paul writes, "Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own?" -2 Corinthians 6:19

God has given each of us a physical body that, like an automobile, is a masterfully engineered, complex vehicle that carries us along our road of life. Like our cars, our bodies need attention and care to function optimally and bring us smoothly down the road of life.

Of course, many of us have health problems for factors beyond our control, such as genetics, environment and misfortune. With so many variables over which we have *no control*, we need to do our best with the variables we *can* control.

For June, dedicate yourselves to being a better steward of your body. Here are some ideas:

Get a physical. A doctor can evaluate you and advise you on optimizing your health.

Next Women's bible study is on sabbatical until September.


A spaghetti dinner fundraiser is planned for October 21st.
